
# THE AUGUSTINE'S ANNOUNCER SUMMER 2018


As we prepare for the summer break we pray:






The aim of the programme was to use Year 10 Mentors to develop younger students confidence and help them manage any anxiety or stress they may be feeling both in and out of school

### MEMORIAL SERVICE

#### 1878 Haydock Wood Pit Disaster

On 7th June the choir attended the Memorial service for the 1878 Haydock Wood pit disaster. Over 100 people attended the event including retired miners, locals, and members of the council. Freya Maudsley Year 8 read the poem Weep Mothers Weep and lit a candle in remembrance of the 204 people that died in the disaster.

After the performance Connor McGinn MP came over to congratulate the choir for their moving performance, they sang Run by Coldplay and A Miners Song by Dan and Laura Curtis. We received lots of wonderful comments from councillors and the public after the performance.

Fantastic performance the pupils are a real credit to the school, they did a great job of helping with the healing process.

A big thank you to Haydock library for inviting us to perform and providing us with lovely refreshments and a book each commemorating the event.

### FIRE SERVICE ASSEMBLY

The St Helens Fire Service very kindly came into school recently to hold Assemblies for each year group, to talk about the dangers and consequences surrounding fires. The talks were interesting and informative and also highlighted how firefighters risk their own lives on a daily basis whilst undertaking their jobs, sometimes in situations which could, and should, have been avoided.



### YEAR 10 VISIT LIVERPOOL UNIVERSITY

The visit consisted of a trip to Liverpool University where students had a tour of the campus, and experienced lessons such as Sociology, Zoology and Chinese where they needed to understand how to use chopsticks, count to 100 and play bingo in another language.



### SHAPING FUTURES WITH CHEMISTRY

Well done to all of the year 9 and year 10 students, 60 in total, who took part in round 2 of Shaping Futures with Chemistry programme.

The project brought in lecturers from Liverpool John Moores University for the second time to raise awareness of the importance of science as a future career choice. Students were challenged to look at the wide range of opportunities resulting from a degree in chemistry and more importantly, their earning potential in the market place. Students got chance to create an object using polymorph, a type of plastic that could be easily shaped and moulded but would set within seconds. They also considered the future of plastics and it's impact on our environment. It is very clear that our problems with plastic pollution lies within the hands of our next generation of scientists to develop and pioneer new, biodegradable plastics. Perhaps one day, a scientist from St Augustines.

The programme also included a trip to the labs in Liverpool John Moores University. Year 9 focussed on using techniques and equipment seen in CSI investigations, such as blood typing, drug testing and microscopy to solve a murder case. Year 10s used state of the art equipment to test food items for vitamin content, iron content and the presence of colorants used in the drinks industry.

The top 3 scientists from each participating year group will be announced so please keep your eyes and ear open as they will be receiving a very special award very soon.

### University Centre St Helens and Shaping Futures inspire over 100 local students

Discovery Day 2018 saw over 100 students from a range of schools in both the St Helens and Knowsley boroughs participate in a series of higher education workshops at University Centre St Helens, as part of a joint project between University Centre St Helens and the new outreach programme for the Liverpool City Region, Shaping Futures.

Receiving an inspirational speech upon arrival from St Helens born Emmerdale actor, Michael Parr, students from several schools, including St Augustine's, went on to discover the benefits of university level study, locally.

Attendees spent the day participating in a range of interactive sessions, in subjects including Creative Media, Criminal Justice, Graphic Design, Game Art and Microbiology, all designed to give students a flavour of what it is like to study at degree level, before moving onto CV writing and self-reflection workshops.

Over lunch, students heard from former soldier and campaigner, Andy Reid, winner of The Sun's Millie Award for Overcoming Adversity in 2010. Since winning the award, Andy has become a passionate Ambassador for the charity and spoke inspirationally to students about the adversity he has overcome since stepping on an IED plate whilst serving in Afghanistan in 2009. Encouraging students to breakdown their goals into bite sized, achievable chunks, Andy's speech encompassed the overall aims of the day, as University Centre St Helens and Shaping Futures work together to try and widen both access to, and participation with, higher level study for local youngsters.

Emmerdale Actor Michael Parr was impressed by the initiative and said, "I think it's important to explore all avenues but university is a good way to move forward. If you're from a working-class background, like a lot



of families in St Helens, then why not stay at home, save money but still go to a good quality university on your doorstep to gain a degree."

Dempsey, Director of Jennifer Sixth Form at The Sutton Academy added. "Sixth Form students from Sutton Academy were truly inspired at the recent University Centre St Helens and Shaping Futures Discovery Day. It was great for the students to see the range of degree options available to them locally, as well as experiencing student life on the University Centre St Helens campus. Hearing from inspirational speakers really motivated the group and the variety of sessions, covering a range of new subjects, provided real insight into different career pathways that the students may not previously have considered."

The campaign gave students some real insight into the range of



Huge congratulations to all of our year 7 and 8 girls who then went


